EARTHQUAKE

Two shocks of an earthquake were very sensibly felt in this place, on Thursday last - many more are said to be noticed, in the course of that day, but the shock about 40 minutes after 8 o'clock in the morning, and another about 11 o'clock at night, were of sufficient violence to be felt very generally by the inhabitants.

EARTHQUAKE

On Thursday morning last, about 9 o'clock, this place was again visited by a shock of an Earthquake. It was supposed to have been almost as severe as any heretofore experienced, and about the same duration. From the papers which have reached us since the last shock, it seems to have been felt very sensibly throughout the Western Country. At Louisville several chimnies were broken off, glasses were thrown off the tables, and fissures were made in the ground for an inch wide and several yards long.
